133rd Annual Congress



The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution held its 133rd Annual Congress in beautiful, sunny Orlando, FL. Congress was held from July 13th - 20th. On Thursday night, during the President General's Banquet, special recognition and awards were given to those surviving World War II Veterans who were still active SAR members. There were a total of six veterans recognized by the Georgia Society. Of those six, two distinguished veterans, we are proud to claim, are Atlanta Chapter members. They are: Compatriots William G. Hays, Jr. and Albert H. Sturgess, Jr. Compatriot 'Hank' Sturgess is an Atlanta Chapter Past President and turned 102 years young in May!

Atlanta news station FOX 5 aired a story on Compatriot Sturgess for his birthday in May, then on June 6 for the historic D-Day Invasion. During the interview, the SAR was also mentioned.

Compatriots Hays and Sturgess are products of what has been called the Greatest Generation due to their level of sacrifice and service. These were the Americans who endured the want and woe of the Great Depression and the personal sacrifices of World War II. They were a generation forced into extreme poverty with no safety net for the unemployed. Therefore, many families were left homeless. Yet, as this nation began to emerge from the economic turmoil of the depression and World War II began, there was a culture of sacrifice - to serve.

According to the US Department of Veterans Affairs statistics, about 167,000 of the 16 million Americans who served in World War II are alive in 2023. That is only 1 in every 100 veterans. It is estimated that a few thousand D-Day veterans may be still alive; the youngest being in their late 90s. A few dozen made it to Normandy - amazingly! - for the 79th anniversary.

Neither Compatriots Hays or Sturgess were able to attend the SAR Congress in Orlando. However, they were recognized for their service to a grateful nation.



Guest Speaker Edward M. Anderson



James & William Dysart Dedication of a Grave Marker



On Saturday August 26, the dedication of a grave marker was held for Patriots James & William Dysart. The ceremony was observed in the pavilion at the historic Pine Log United Methodist Church in Rydal, Bartow County, GA.

Cenotaph

James and his son William both died on February 1, 1781 during the Revolutionary War Battle of Cowan's Ford, North Carolina. The men who were killed in that battle were buried at night, it is believed, in a mass grave at the Hopewell Presbyterian Church, in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina.

James Dysart, who was born in Ireland in 1727, and his son **William**, born in 1751, both served in the North Carolina Militia and were killed in action on 1 February 1781 during the Battle of Cowan's Ford in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina.



The role of the Veterans Respect Committee is to pursue opportunities to honor and recognize current service members and veterans of past service. A wide range of activities fall under this charge. Some examples are:

- -hours served in the VA Hospital (VAH) Volunteer Service,
- -visiting a veteran in a VAH, nursing home or private home,
- -donating personal care items to a VAH or nursing home serving veterans,
- -donating publications to a VAH,
- -organizing an outing for one or more veterans,
- -participating in a veteran's funeral as a participant, pallbearer, or attendee,
- -attendance at Revolutionary War Veteran's Grave Marking,
- -participating in placing flags or wreaths on veteran's graves.

We are aware that many of our Atlanta Chapter members have been involved in such activities, but we do not know the extent. We would like to gather information on such efforts.
