
Program Speaker Dr. David Noble



Atlanta Chapter's own Dr. David Noble, was our October meeting presenter. A recognized subject matter expert, Dr. Noble described the "Battle Sequence at Kettle Creek" which was fought on February 14, 1779 in Wilkes County, Georgia. This battle was important because it was the first major victory for Patriots in the back country of Georgia during the American Revolutionary War. With handouts supplied to the members, which included an historical map of the immediate and surrounding battlefield, Dr. Noble chronicled the series of events that lead to the Patriots decisive victory and scattered a Loyalist militia force on its way to British-controlled Augusta.

It was Col. John Boyd, who commanded the 700 Loyalists who crossed Kettle Creek on a wagon road. At about 10 AM, on February 14, 1779, Dr. Noble recounted, "Patriot Col. Andrew Pickens with about 300 Whig Militia arrived at the northern end of the battlefield on horse. John Dooley with 50 Georgia Militia on horse were on the right flank; Lt. Col. Elijah Clark and 50 Georgia Militia on horse were on the left flank. Col. Andrew Pickens of South Carolina with 200 men on horse advanced in the center with Maj. Andrew Hamilton on the right flank, Capt. McCall in the center and Col. Pickens on the left flank."

After being fired up, and killing four men, Compatriot Noble, noted, "Col. Pickiens' men started a mounted charge with Lt. Col. Clark from the top of Old Liberty Church Hill, forcing Col. Boyd and about 75 men to run 100 yards down the hill where Maj. Hamilton's men fired three shots, mortally wounded Col. Boyd. The remainder of Boyd's men fled across the creek.

As Col. Pickens crossed Kettle Creek on the road, it was stated that "Lt. Col. Clark and his mounted men Loyalists, running around the southernmost hill, killing at least 22 with swords and hatchets.



Clark's horse was shot out from under him as he started to cross from the east on another trail. The battle on the north side lasted 20 minutes. On rising ground (War Hill) on the south side of Kettle Creek, Lt. Col. Clark, Col. Dooly and Col. Pickens surrounded about 150 Loyalists commanded by Lt. Col. John Moore, killing about 25 and capturing 75.

Dr. Noble explained that "the majority of Lt. Col. John Moore's men under Maj. John or more south on a hill (long ridge) attempting to get to Loyalists Capt. McGirth's camp on Little River. The battle on the south side lasted 40 minutes." Ultimately, the cost of the battle was "about 7-14 Patriots were killed, 18 wounded; 23 Patriot prisoners released. Loyalists lost about 50 killed, 225 captured and an additional 270 escaped."

During his discussion, Compatriot Noble also mentioned the historical significance of Patriot Austin Dabney. Dabney served as an artilleryman under Elijah Clarke and is believed to have been the only Black soldier to take part in the Battle of Kettle Creek.

In Recognition of Veterans Day



On November 12, 2023 at the Historic Mark Tabernacle Baptist Church in Washington, Ga. where Rev. Larry Hill serves as Pastor (standing right), Honorable Mayor Bill DeGolian (kneeling) and Rev. Ed Anderson GASSAR State Chaplin. **Evans "Mr. Duck" Moore** was honored with a late Veterans Day Celebration. Mr. Duck Moore, as he is called, is 106 years young and a living veteran of World War II. The congregation was honored and privileged to see and listen to him speak about his life experiences. "Mr. Duck" enlisted in the Army on July 11, 1942. On an earlier occasion, he stated he enlisted in the Army due to hearing the often quoted expression, "the Army will make a man out of you".

As a 123 pound, five-foot, five-inch young man, he was sent to Fort Benning for rigorous basic training. He discovered, however, that the rigors of being the son of a sharecropper had adequately prepared him for the physical demands of basic training and a fit and successful man in the Army. After Fort Benning, "Mr. Duck" was sent to Camp Wheeler, in Macon, Georgia for assignment, then to Fort Huachuca, Arizona. He is the father of three children, with 2 surviving and 14 adult grandchildren and with many great-grandchildren. His son Albert, after graduating from the University of Georgia followed his dad's example of serving in the military. Now a

retired Air Force Major, he served more than twenty years in the military and now lives in Boston, Mass. During the winter months, Albert often makes his way home to Washington, Georgia, to spend time with his dad.



Wounded Warrior Award



On December 3rd, Atlanta Chapter Past President presented the Wounded Warrior Coin & Certificate to Ron Tims.

Tims is a USMC Marine who served in Vietnam, volunteering at the age of 21 from his home State of Tennessee. He was awarded two Purple Hearts while serving. The first after being shot and the second after a land mine exploded killing a Marine in front of him and sending shrapnel back in his legs breaking both. This wound would send him stateside for recovery, which took over a year before he was able to walk again.




