### Next Meeting – Thursday, June 12<sup>th</sup> @ Noon





### 250th Anniversary Lexington & Concord

The reenactment of Paul Revere's Midnight Ride on April 18, 1775, kicked off the commemorative events, as he rode on horseback from Charlestown to Lexington to warn John Hancock and Samuel Adams of the impending British raid. His arrival set in motion the chain of events that led to armed rebellion on Lexington Green at dawn the next day, when British soldiers arrived on April 19, 1775.

On Saturday, April 19, the Lexington Minute Men conducted the 250th reenactment of the Civilian Evacuation and Battle of Lexington on the historic Battle Green. The dramatic portrayal was followed by Lexington's 2025 Patriots' Day Parade, celebrating the enduring legacy of the Revolutionary War.

According to the Lexington History Museums, on the night of April 18, 1775, more than 700 British soldiers set out from Boston to



In April, Atlanta Chapter member George K. Wysong (pictured left) traveled with his family to commemorate the 250th Anniversary of Lexington and Concord—a four-day event honoring the historic moments that set our nation on the path to independence. On April 19, 1775, the "shot heard 'round the world" signaled the start of the American Revolutionary War, marking a pivotal turning point in history. Long associated with the Battles of Lexington and Concord, this defining moment is now commemorated annually as Patriots' Day. This National NSSAR Event was part of the America 250 Program, which commemorates a decade of the American Revolution. Participation in the 250th Anniversary events earns points toward the Bronze, Silver, and Gold NSSAR 250th Anniversary Medals.

The historic journey began in Boston, where the Sons of Liberty orchestrated a signal from the tallest church steeple to alert Concord of the British army's route of march. Two lanterns, displayed in the Old North Church steeple, signified that the regulars were crossing Boston Harbor ("one if by land, two if by sea"). As Paul Revere and William Dawes rode through the surrounding towns, others joined the effort, sounding alarms with ringing church bells and warning shots. Minutemen and local militia assembled on town greens, ensuring that by the time the British forces crossed Boston Harbor to Lechmere Point, word of their mission had already reached Concord.



Concord, determined to destroy a cache of ammunition and supplies meant for an anticipated conflict. As dawn broke the following morning, the Lexington town militia stood resolute, prepared to block their advance. The two forces faced off on the town common—then, a single, mysterious shot rang out. The British soldiers opened fire, and when the smoke cleared, eight Americans lay dead, ten more wounded. In that moment, the war for independence had begun.


# 250th Anniversary of the American Revolution Recognition Program






The recognition program is designed to encourage and recognize those compatriots, chapters and societies that participate in local, state, national and international events which publicly educate, and recognize, honor, and celebrate the events and heroes of the period surrounding the American Revolution. Participation involves the planning and execution of these events, as well as attendance. The medal covers any event celebrating and promoting the 250th Anniversary. This therefore will cover any public events celebrating and promoting the 250th Anniversary in the period from 2014 to 2033. Forms may be submitted for multiple years Scorekeeping is the responsibility of each compatriot and awarding authority. The awarding authority for each medal is as follows. The Bronze Medal is authorized and recorded by the local chapter. The Silver Medal is Authorized and recorded by the state society. The Gold Medal only is authorized and recorded by the NSSAR 250th Anniversary Committee. Only Gold Medal applications should be submitted to the NSSAR 250th Anniversary Committee using the email address below:

- a. Directing, chairing or co-chairing an event or sub-committee for the duration of the event. (20 points)
- b. Participation in the planning, financing, promotion or conduct of an event other than directing, chairing, or cochairing an event. Those that do direct, chair or co-chair and event and also serve as a regular member of a committee or sub-committee in a non-leadership role, may also earn points. (10 points)
- c. Attending an Event (3 points)
- d. Attending an event in Colonial Attire (5 points)

Points are cumulative. The maximum points that can be awarded for any one event is 28 points.

#### > SAR Members may be awarded the Medals for achieving the following levels:

- a. Bronze Medal: 25 promotion points as certified by his chapter, state.
- b. Silver Medal: 60 promotion points as certified by his state society.
- c. Gold Medal: 150 promotion points as certified by the NSSAR 250th Anniversary Committee.

#### > Non-SAR members may also be awarded these medals:

- a. The chapter may present bronze awards to its Partners in Patriotism, and may recommend its Partners to the state or national society for higher recognition.
- b. The state and district may present silver awards to its Partners in Patriotism, and may recommend its Partners to the national society for higher recognition.
- c. The national society may present gold awards to its Partners in Patriotism.
- ➤ <u>Streamer.</u> Streamers are available for chapters, state societies and districts to present to Partners in Patriotism for attendance or participation in a 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Event. i.e. Scouting Units, DAR Chapters, etc. They are available for purchase from merchandising at a cost of \$5.00 each.

Please find enclosed proposed amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws of the National Society approved, adopted, and proposed by the Virginia Society pursuant to Article VIII of the Constitution and Bylaw 35, respectively. These proposed amendments were considered at our annual meeting on February 8, 2025, and all but one (relating to the Genealogy Committee) were unanimously adopted and approved by our membership for proposal to the delegates at the next Annual Congress; the proposed amendment relating to the Genealogy Committee was also adopted and approved for proposal to the delegates at the next Annual Congress but not unanimously.

The proposed amendments are as follows:

- Bylaw 7: Providing for a Financial Professional in the Role of Treasurer General
- Article IV, Sec. 1 of the Constitution and Bylaws 3, 5A (new) and 6: Creating the Position of Executive Vice President General
- 3. Article III(5) of the Constitution and Bylaw 1: Memorial Membership
- 4. Bylaw 1: Provisional Membership
- 5. Bylaw 2: At-Large Membership
- 6. Bylaw 18: The Executive Committee
- 7. Bylaw 19: The Genealogy Committee
- 8. Bylaw 21: The Nominating Committee

In accordance with Article VIII of the Constitution and Bylaw 35, I respectfully request that you notify each of the General Officers, members of the Executive Committee, National Trustees, State Society Presidents and Secretaries of the proposed amendments no later than 45 days prior to the convening of the 135th Annual Congress in Uncasville, CT.

Rationale: The memorial membership has been a popular way to preserve the memory and genealogy of eligible men who did not join the SAR during their lifetimes. The proposed amendment will expand the availability of memorial memberships beyond relatives of the current members of the SAR and will introduce new genealogical lines of descent for future generations.

Rationale: Chapters and state societies have repeatedly raised the problem of maintaining an applicant's enthusiasm for SAR membership from the time an application is submitted and the time the application is reviewed and approved at the national headquarters. By designating an applicant as a "Provisional Member" once the application has been approved at the state level and received at the national headquarters, the chapter can begin integrating the applicant into the chapter's meetings and other activities. The bylaw would also provide state societies and chapters with the option to allow Provisional Members to hold positions at the state or chapter level. This will be particularly helpful to struggling chapters who can make use of an enthusiastic, energetic applicant sooner than is possible at present.

The amendment to Bylaw 22 is to make it absolutely clear that Provisional Members are not counted as members from whom a state society is required to collect and pay over national dues.

Rationale: Permitting a national at-large membership is consistent with the goal of retaining existing members. The current requirement that SAR members also be a member of a State Society results in National Life Members and Emeritus Members being dropped from membership on the nonpayment of *state* dues. Additionally, to the

extent that there are members who would remain as members of the SAR if they did not have to maintain their membership in a chapter or State Society, this will allow the SAR to retain those members and the annual dues paid by those members.
